2024 Honored Old Timer Glenn ("Gos") Gostick

The legendary and colorful Glenn Gostick was born on January 27, 1928 to parents Glenn and Bessie (Borseth). After graduating from North High in 1946, he joined the Army and played baseball in Japan with the First Calvary Division team, for which he was Captain; the team won the All-Pacific Area Championship in 1947. Following his return to the States, he attended the University of Minnesota, graduating with a degree in Physical Therapy and a minor in Physical Education. He later did post-graduate work at Western Reserve University in Cleveland, as well as at the University of Colorado Medical Center.

While at the University of Minnesota, Gos played for Dick Siebert, being starting catcher from 1949 through 1951. He then played professional ball for the Duluth Dukes, for Mayville KY, and for Muskogee, OK. Returning to Minnesota, Gos was a U of M baseball camp instructor from 1958 through 1961, and he also served as interim Head Coach in 1959 -- continuing as an Assistant Coach during the 1960's, including during the 1960 and 1964 National Championship seasons. At the same time, after the Twins moved to Minnesota in 1961, Gos became the Director of Twins' clinics, after initially working as an instructor. He shared his talents across the globe as well -- being coach, director and advisor for both the Swedish and Dutch baseball associations, in their organizational infancy. Beginning in 1969, he umpired amateur, high school and college baseball -- and also became an Official Scorer for MLB, handling Twins home games into the late 1980's.

As a Sports Medicine professional, in addition to working with many other organizations, Gos notably served as Trainer for the Minneapolis Lakers, and the MN Junior Stars and MN Fighting Saints hockey teams -- as well as, in 1976, for the U.S. National Junior hockey team in Sweden and the U.S. National hockey team in Poland. He became the Director of Sports Medicine for North Memorial Medical Center, in addition to having worked as a physical therapist for Sheltering Arms (originally founded as a convalescent hospital for persons with polio, which first employed newly-developed Sister Kenny treatment methods), as well as for various orthopedic groups in the Twin Cities.

Gos was particularly well-known for his extraordinary, visionary statistics -- completed by hand, due to his aversion to computers (and similarly, to telephones, preferring to communicate by leaving notes or sending letters.) Being a dapper dresser (in tweeds and plaids), he especially enjoyed the holidays, being known as Mr. Santa Claus. As a lifelong bachelor, he truly enjoyed time with his six nephews and nieces. In retirement, he moved to Montrose, CO in 2009 to be closer to family, and, upon his passing on March 15, 2011, he donated his body to the University of Colorado Medical School. Always refusing recognition and accolades from our organization while he was alive, we pay tribute to Gos tonight, posthumously, as the 2024 Honored Old Timer.
