Tri-City Reds dominate Play Day at Bill Newhouse Tournament

Thursday was Play Day at the 25th Annual Bill Newhouse Tournament. Teams of four from the teams participating in the tournament competed in: golf, canoe races and bowling.

Individual athletes competed at Denton Field in: outfield arm accuracy, base running and the always popular home run derby.

The Tri-City Reds dominated the day. In the golf competition, the Reds tied for first place with the team of umpires.

The Reds also won the canoe races that were held on Scanlan Lake.

The Miles City Mavericks brought home the trophy in the bowling. The team of: Nate Dunning, Ryan Harris, Darron Alderman and Josh Hetler.

It was the individual events, held at Denton Field, that brought out the crowds. A large crowd filled Denton Field to watch these athletes compete.

The outfield arm accuracy competition had the players throw from a box in center field. A screen was set up behind home plate, that the players attempted to hit, either on the fly or on the bounce. Points were given on how many bounces it took to reach the net. Three points were given for a throw on the fly, two points for a throw with one bounce, and one point with multiple bounces.

In the outfield arm accuracy: Evan Eid of Tri-City, Ross Hudson of Shepherd, Scotty Berke of Las Vegas, Beau Grezik of Rapid City, Jesse Haidle of Miles City, Chuck Howard of Las Vegas and Joe Colwell of Tri-City advanced to the final round.

In the final round, Eid set a new record by scoring six points. All three of his throws were on the mark, and hit on one bounce. Berke came in second place with three poings, one of only two throws to hit the net on the fly.

Grezik, Haidle, Howard and Colwell each scored two points to finish third.

The base running event, had the players start at home plate and run around the bases, touching each base, and ending at home plate.

The top five times in the first round moved on to the championship. Justin Hemauer of Tri-City had the top time in the first round at 14.28, Miles City's Pat Regan was second with a time of 14.64, Berke was third with a time of 14.69, Cory Sheets of Tri-City was

fourth with a time of 14.71 and Tanner Crevier of Miles City qualified with a time of 14.90.

The places held to form, for the most part, as Hemauer won with a time of 14.47 in the final round. Regan was third with a time of 14.70 and Crevier was fifth with a time of 15.59.

Everybody's favorite event, the home run derby, was next. Fourteen athletes signed up to take part in the event.

Players were given 10 outs in the first round.

Jake Wichman of Great Falls led after the first round with two home runs. Miles City's Brian Laney and Tom Miller from Las Vegas each hit one to move on. No other player had any home runs in the first round.

In the final round, Wichman and Laney each hit one home run. Three more rounds of five outs were given to Wichman and Laney to break the tie, but neither could hit one.

Finally in a round of ten, and the lights needing to be turned on, Wichman hit a long fly ball that landed about 20 feet over the fence and was 10 feet fair to win the competition.

Tournament play will resume today with four games scheduled. Games start at 12:30 p.m. and the last game starting at 8 p.m. at Denton Field.

Time for Miles City to give back

On June 16, one of the scariest things in all of sports happened, again.

Taylor Roberts, a 14-year old member of the Laurel Dodgers American Legion team, was throwing batting practice before their game against the Broadus Mudcats.

Roberts threw a pitch. The batter hit the ball. Roberts was unable to get behind the "L" in the L-screen. The ball hit Roberts in the temple.

The teammates were in a batting cage when it happened.

According to reports, Roberts fell to the ground immediately, but didn't lose consciousness. An ambulance was called, and Roberts was rushed to the hospital were he began treatment for a fractured skull and a crushed temple.

According to the pastor at Roberts church, Taylor was pulled out of his induced of his coma a couple of days ago. His memory and speech have been affected, but he is recovering well.

More information on Roberts injuries will come later next week as more tests are being done.

The Laurel community has rallied around Roberts, and his family. There have been many different fund raisers to help support the family. From a float in the Laurel Fourth of July parade, to a 2-on-2 basketball tournament. Classmates at Laurel have done car washes that have raised a substantial amount of money.

When Miles City lost Brandon Patch in a similar incident, our community and many around the state rallied. And now it's time to rally around Laurel and the Roberts family.

Miles Citians should know first hand how this type of incident can affect everyone, just remember the funeral at Denton Field. So Miles Citians, it's time to give back the sympathy and support that we received in 2003.

If this story sounds similar, it should and it shouldn't. Yes, a metal bat was used. Yes the kid pitching was hit in the head. It does remind us a bit of our own tragedy, Brandon Patch.

But there are differences in the story. Roberts was hit while in a batting cage. In most batting cages, there is around 30 feet between the pitcher and batter. Some even as close as 15 feet. There is absolutely no time to react.

I have been throwing batting practice in batting cages for around 10 years now, and I have become very adept to getting behind the L-screen. A couple of broken teeth will do that to you. So I know how fast that ball can get to the pitcher.

In Brandon's case, there is a chance that a wood bat could have saved his life. In this case, I don't think so.

At that close range, there isn't much that could have been done. A ball off a wood bat at that range would have done much the same. But the argument is still there that wood bats are safer than metal bats.

So this brings up the wood bat debate again.

I don't mean to jump on my soap box, but I'm going to anyway.

I have made my feelings on this subject well known. And will continue too. There are too many kids being hurt, or killed, with the use of metal bats. Somewhere along the line, people need to figure this out. This is no longer just a "Miles City" issue.

So Miles City, I urge you to keep Taylor Roberts, and his family, in your prayers and support them as much as you can.

Mavs drop second game to tough Sierra Vista

The offenses came out of hiding in the second day of the 25th Annual Blue Rock Distributing/Pepsi-Cola Bill Newhouse Invitational Tournament.

After letting the pitchers control the first day of the tournament, the offenses combined to score 32 runs in the four games, with two of the games being called by the 10-run mercy rule.

But pitching and defense weren't completely forgotten about. There was a no-hitter in one game, and a shutout in another.

All of the teams are off on Thursday for the Play Day. There are a golf competition, canoe races, bowling tournament and a skills competition. The skills competition will be held at Denton Field at 7 p.m.

LAS VEGAS 12, MILES CITY 2

The Sierra Vista Lions (Las Vegas, Nev.) came out of the gate swinging, and never stopped, en route to a 12-2 victory over the Mavericks in the second day of the 2005 Bill Newhouse Tournament.

"We just got flat out beat tonight," Mavs Head Coach Brian Larson said. "They came out and stung the ball. Even their outs were hit hard. And we didn't come alive until the fourth inning."

Las Vegas lead-off hitter, Scotty Berke, led off the game with a long triple, and that set the tone for the game. The Lions scored a run in each of the first two innings off of Miles City's starter, Jesse Haidle. In the third, the Lions took advantage of a couple of walks, and scored three more runs.

After giving up the three runs in the third, with no outs, Haidle settled in and retired the next six batters.

Down 5-0 in the fourth, the Mavs' offense finally got rolling.

Craig Parry led off the inning with a double. Brian Laney followed with a sharp single to right field. The Lions' right-fielder overthrew everybody on the field, and Parry was able to score and Laney moved on to third base.

Haidle helped himself when he grounded out to the third baseman, which brought in Laney to bring the Mavs closer, 5-2.

In the top of the fifth inning, the Lions seemed to want to end the game early with the 10run mercy rule. They needed to score seven runs in the inning, and they did just that.

Three Miles City pitchers were used in the inning, which saw the Lions score seven runs on five hits, and three walks by Mavs pitching.

In the bottom of the fifth, with the Mavs needing to score at least one run to keep playing, the Mavs got two runners on base but were not able to score them, and the game ended by the mercy rule.

"It was a combination of things," Larson said. "Sometimes you play well, and get beat. There's not much you can do about that." There are different schools of thought in the game of baseball: Some think a win is a win, and a loss is a loss, while others think that losing to a good team is better than beating a bad team.

"I don't know if it's better in the sense that a win is a win and a loss is a loss," Larson explained. "But you can learn a lot more from getting beat by a team like that, rather than beating a team where you can capitalize on errors, and bad baseball. We definitely learned a few things tonight."

The Mavs picked up only four hits in the ball game. Pat Regan, Parry, Laney and Chris Bogner each had hits in the game. Parry's double was the lone extra base hit.

All but one of the Lions' starters had base hits, and all nine scored at least once.

Berke was 2-3 with two runs scored and a triple. Kyle Gutchewsky, Pat Grennan, David Stretz and Thomas Miller were each 1-2 with two runs scored and an RBI, and Drew Leary was 2-4 with two RBI's, a run scored and a double.

The Mavs, 0-2, will play again on Friday at 5:30 against the Tri-City Reds.

TRI-CITY 12, SHEPERD 2

In their first game of the day, the Tri-City, Minn., Reds easily took care of the Shepherd, Mont., Bullets.

Reds starting pitcher, Blake Searles, tossed a no-hitter for the Reds.

The Reds scored runs in each of the six innings that were played. Their big inning came in the fifth, when they scored five runs on two hits.

Derek McCallum had the big bat for the Reds. He hit the tournament's first home run, an inside-the-park shot to the right-center field gap. He was 2-4, with four RBIs and two runs scored to go along with the home run.

The Reds also got good offensive support from Joe Colwell, who was 2-2 with three runs scored and a double; Chase Traeger, 2-3, three runs scored, RBI; and Justin Hemauer, 1-4, two runs scored and an RBI.

Searles threw all six innings, giving up two runs, but unearned, on no hits. He struck out six Bullets and walked five.

The Bullets got on the board in the third inning, with a walk, a stolen base and a throwing error that allowed two runners to score.

Searles retired the final 11 batters he faced. He walked three in that stretch, but Reds catcher Derek Moen threw all three runners out attempting to steal second base.

Shepherd, 0-2, will be in action again on Friday when they play the Great Falls Black Sox at 12:30 p.m.

RAPID CITY 2, TRI-CITY 1

Two outstanding pitching performances in the second game of the second day of the tournament were turned in by A.J. Butt of Rapid City, S.D., and Seth Rosin of Tri-City. A couple of early mistakes by Rosin gave the Rapid City Post 320 Stars the 2-1 victory over the Reds.

Kyle Starkey led off the game for Rapid City by being beaned by Rosin. Nathan Jacobson laid down a sacrifice bunt to move Starkey to second. Zane Roduner, the third batter in the order for Rapid City, was also beaned by Rosin. A wild pitch allowed Starkey to move to third and Roduner to move to second.

After striking out Nick Miessner, Rosin gave up a two-RBI single to Travis Burhans.

Rosin retired the next five batters, and then gave up back to back singles to Jacobson and Roduner in the third inning.

Miessner stepped up to the plate and drilled a hard ground ball to the right of second base. Reds second baseman Chase Traeger dove full out and caught the ball cleanly, laying down, and tossed the ball to Derek McCallum, who fired to first to complete the double play.

In the final three innings, Rosin allowed three more base runners. But none got as far as third base.

The potent Reds offense didn't get going until the fourth inning, and even then Butt was able to control the game.

With one out, Justin Hemauer stepped up and drove the first pitch he saw into the batting cages over the right field wall for the first home run to leave the park.

Butt promptly struck out the next batter and got out of the inning with no more runs.

In the top of the seventh inning, with the Reds down 2-1, the Reds were on the verge of tying up the game.

Walks to Adam Weber and Brady Field to lead off the inning caused the Rapid City coaches to pull Butt off the mound and bring in Burhans.

Burhans quickly picked off Weber from second base, and struck out Matt Frakes to get two quick outs. Bjorn Anderson was the final hope for the Reds, but he grounded out to the first baseman. Butt ended the game, throwing six innings, giving up one run on five hits. He struck out four and walked four. Burhans picked up the save, facing two batters, getting three outs with a strike out mixed in.

Rosin took the tough loss for the Reds. He threw six innings, giving up two runs on six hits. He struck out seven, walked none and hit two batters.

Burhans led the Stars' offense, going 2-3 with two RBIs. Hemauer was the offensive leader for the Reds, going 2-3 with the lone run and RBI on his home run.

In the seventh inning, Hunter started to tire. He gave up two singles to start the inning, and walked the third batter to load the bases with no outs.
