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12 press on toward Sunday's finals

After a grueling first day of action at four fields, 12 teams advanced in the Minnesota American Legion Division I Baseball Tournament at New Ulm.

In the double elimination format, four teams advanced unbeaten, eight teams split their games on the first day, and four teams went home.

The four unbeatens are Apple Valley, Wayzata, the Academy Stars and Rochester Patriots

They will play in the two late games at Johnson Park on Friday. Wayzata will take on the Academy Stars at 4:30 p.m. and Rochester Patriots will play Apple Valley at 7:30 p.m.

The teams with 1-1 records are Eagan, Mankato Nationals, Willmar, Grand Rapids, Fergus Falls, Buffalo, Hamline Purple and New Ulm Gold.

In Friday games, Eagan will play Mankato at 10 a.m. at Johnson Park, Willmar will play Grand Rapids at 10 at Mueller Field.

Fergus Falls will take on Buffalo at 1 p.m. at Johnson and Hamline Purple will play New Ulm at 1 p.m. at Mueller.

The teams with two losses who were eliminated from the tournament were Hopkins, Excelsior, St. Paul Park and Waite Park. Hopkins and Excelsior were both ranked in the top five in the final Legion Baseball poll.

The scores of Thursday's games were much lower than last year's scores from the first round, indicating either better pitching or less hitting, or both.

There were several classic games during the day including a 10-inning game at

Essig Field with Grand Rapids edging Excelsior 12-11. Keith Kleinendorst hit two homeruns for Grand Rapids and ended up with seven RBI. The Rapids team won on a walk-off single by Jake Bischoff.

There were 28 hits and nine errors in the game.

There were four one-run games during the day.

Andy Johnson and Billy Soule pitched Wayzata victories the first day. Soule struck out 11 in six innings of an 8-1 victory over Fergus Falls.

The Rochester Patriots stayed in the winners bracket as Brian Anderson pitched a three-hitter with nine strikeouts in an 8-1 win over Eagan.

Matt Miller had three hits to lead Rochester's attack.

Mankato Nationals eliminated St. Paul Park 6-5 with Brock Lloyd pitching a complete game.

Play will continue through Sunday. The winner and the runner-up will both qualify for national regional tournaments being held at Minnetonka and at Appleton, Wisconsin.

The World Series this year will be in Fargo, North Dakota.

Division II play begins today in LeSueur/Henderson.

Teams involved in the Division II tourney are Jordan, last year's champion, Pipestone, Royalton, Hayfield, Pelican Rapids, Esko, Eden Valley/Watkins and host LeSueur.

The regional tournament for Division II will be in Milbank, South Dakota.

After 75 years, Manderfeld still a champ



A smile came to Ray Manderfeld's face earlier this week as he recalled the State American Legion Baseball title he and his New Ulm teammates won in 1934.

Manderfeld, now 88, was the youngest player on the '34 team at 13 and ½ years old. He played in two more state tournaments during his Legion career and for years stayed in touch with his teammates.

"They're all gone except for two of us," said Manderfeld. "We had great camaraderie on that team ... and four

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Stars shine early and late at Essig

Dawn came early on Thursday for the Minneapolis Academy Stars.

"It's been a while since most of us have seen 5:30 a.m.," said pitcher-infielder Kris Kwak. "We got up early and took a long batting practice at Essig Field. This is definitely the earliest we have played this summer."

Once the first-round 8:30 a.m. game with Excelsior got underway at Essig, it was apparent that pitching would decide the outcome. Excelsior starter Mark Ulrich threw a complete game, holding the Stars in check for the most part. The Stars got home runs from Kwak and Jack Hogan in a 2-0 victory.

Meanwhile, Academy Stars pitchers Steven Maher and Kwak combined to pitch a three-hitter.

"Even when you have to get up this early, it's not hard to get excited about a state tournament game," said Maher.

What challenges did the Excelsior lineup pose?

"I was wary of their big guys (Josh Mensch and Taylor Nelson)," said Maher. "And they have a couple other guys in the line-up who are hitting .400."

"My mindset was to come in and throw strikes," said Kwak, who came on in the seventh inning. "We might be the youngest

team here and one of the smallest, but we have a good pitching staff."

Maher, who will play Division I ball at Illinois State next season, is 7-0 following Thursday's win and Kwak, who will play Division I at North Dakota, is 7-1 with seven saves.

Holy Angels head coach Mike Budin acknowledged that it's an advantage to have a couple Division I pitchers at the top of the rotation.

"We have very good pitching and defense, and that's how we've been winning," said Budin, whose team moved to 26-3 with the win over Excelsior. "We didn't have a home run until our 17th game, but we've been hitting with power the last few weeks."

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sets of brothers."

New Ulm had to win only three games in the 1934 state tourney. "We beat the host team, Cokato, 12-10 in the finals," said Manderfeld. "There was some controversy during the tournament because our coaches gave us instructions in German, and some people didn't think that was fair."

Manderfeld said he was not a star on the 1934 team.

"I was the youngest and the smallest," he noted. "Because I was small, they played me kind of shallow. I pinch hit in one game and got a base hit to right field, only the right fielder was playing shallow and threw me out. That was a dubious distinction."

Manderfeld said winning the state title was a thrill, especially since it was only the second year New Ulm fielded a Legion team. For years, the '34 team was the gold standard in New Ulm baseball. Then in 1978, the New Ulm Legion club made it all the way to the World Series. The boys of '78 were known as the Lumber Company.

While New Ulm baseball has gone through its share of changes since the 1930s when Manderfeld and his brothers Stan and Ted played, one thing hasn't

changed.

"New Ulm is still the baseball capital of Minnesota," said Manderfeld.

After his playing career concluded with amateur ball, Manderfeld decided to turn to umpiring.

"Ray was a good player and even better as an umpire," said one New Ulm oldtimer. "He did a lot of the big games."

In addition to devoting himself to baseball, Manderfeld had a successful career as a public servant. He was a rural mailman for 35 years, doing routes in excess of 100 miles for part of his career.

Manderfeld's daughter Mary was one of the best athletes in the New Ulm area and went on to become the girls' basketball coach at Edina High School where she is now a principal. She keeps in touch with her mom and dad on a daily basis.

Manderfeld marvels at the quality of the baseball facilities in New Ulm, especially Johnson Park, which is headquarters for the 2009 State Legion Tournament.

"When I was playing we didn't have Johnson Park, but we had a nice field out at the Fairgrounds," he said.

Born and raised in New Ulm, Manderfeld said he never wanted to live anyplace else. His love for baseball had something to do with that, of course. After all, this is the baseball capital.
