

12 still playing as tourney enters second day

In an eventful first day of the Minnesota American Legion Division I Baseball Tournament, 12 teams are still chasing the prize.

Four teams lost both their games on Friday in the double-elimination tournament. St. Francis, Burnsville, Hamline Purple, and Delano went home.

Lightning caused the Eagan-Champlin game at Eagan to be halted twice and eventually suspended.

The four unbeaten teams that advanced into

Saturday's second round were Excelsior, Hutchinson, Lakeville North, and the winner of the suspended game.

Seven other teams with 1-1 records will try and fight their way back through the losers' bracket. They are: Rochester Redhawks, Tri-City Red, Chaska, New Ulm Gold, Nisswa, Alexandria, St. Cloud Chutes. They will be joined by the loser of the suspended game.

Games will be played at three fields on Saturday. The two winners' bracket games will be played at Eagan Varsity Field at 2 and 5 p.m.

Lightning causes suspended game

When lightning strikes anywhere near a Legion ball field, State Director Mike Perry tells coaches, managers and umpires to err on the side of caution.

A long lightning bolt was prominent in the eastern skies during the final game of the day at Eagan High School Friday, and the teams from Eagan and Champlin Park were taken off of the field by the umpires in the fourth inning with Eagan leading 4-1.

A 30-minute delay followed before Perry and other officials at the site decided it was safe to resume play.

"Even though it looked like the lightning was somewhere near Green Bay, you have to be very careful," said Perry.

When play resumed at 7:48 p.m., Champlin Park scored to make the score 4-2. The game was suspended due to darkness in the top of the fifth inning shortly before 8:35.

"The loser of the Eagan-Champlin Park game is scheduled to play at 10 a.m. Saturday at Red Haddox Field in Bloomington," said

One reason for Excelsior's No. 1 ranking in the state American Legion Baseball is depth.

Third baseman Kyle Hoffman is not the player with the highest profile, but he sure was valuable in the first round of the State Tournament as Excelsior outlasted an upsetminded Burnsville team 5-4.

In the bottom of the sixth, with Excelsior trailing 4-2, Griffin Powell was hit by a pitch. With one out, Derek Branson singled, and then Hoffman singled home a run. Branson scored on a wild pitch to tie the score. 4-4. Hoffman scored the go-ahead run on Aaron Kubal's sacrifice fly.

"We haven't had to come from behind very often," said Hoffman after the game. "I was down two strikes, and I thought he [Burnsville pitcher Zach Smith] would throw me a curveball. I watched it all the way and made contact."

While he is capable clutch hitter, Hoffman's forte is defense.

"Kyle makes all the routine plays," said Excelsior head coach Rob Hager. "And he also makes a lot of plays other third baseman couldn't make. He's the best third baseman I have seen at this level, certainly the best one I've coached.

"Kyle is a very quiet competitor, but one of the strongest competitors on the field."

Hager said that defense was the key to Excelsior's first-round win. Branson, the center

fielder, ran down a long shot to the left-center gap to end the game.

"In the State Tournament, we don't expect to see anyone lay down for us," said Hager. "I expected a dogfight with Burnsville. Luckily, we had guys coming through at the right time."

Branson, the Sub-State 4 MVP, said, "This win shows that we're capable of battling back against a good team. We never got down on ourselves."

Starting pitcher Brian Wold gave Excelsior seven innings before turning the ball over to Connor Oestreich, who recorded the save. Wold's record is 11-0 and he has a miniscule 0.39 ERA

Perry. "We decided the perfect solution would be to resume the Eagan-Champlin Park game at 8:30 a.m. at Red Haddox, and the site manager, Ron Nenovich, will have things ready to go. When that game is completed, the loser will play in the 10 a.m. game. Red Haddox Field has lights and does not have a curfew. But we should be able to get back on schedule."

Perry said he had to make several calls to other coaches who are scheduled to play later in the day at Red Haddox.

"I told them they should check with me in case there is a delay," the State Director said.

For the teams involved in the suspended game, Eagan and Champlin Park, the restart raises strategic issues.

Will the teams come back with Friday's starters, Kevin Inman for Eagan and Trevor Kiminski for Champlin Park? Or will they rest them and opt for new pitchers?

American Legion Baseball rules allow pitchers 12 innings over a three-day span, and there is also a limit of four appearances in three days.

Perry and the local committee members from Eagan hope the State Tournament will go on both rain-free and lightning-free, but if there is inclement weather, Perry promises he will make decisions based on the safety of the ballplayers.
