12 teams play on into second day

Sixteen teams started. Four went home. Four went undefeated. Eight will play on through the losers' bracket.

Opening round action in the Minnesota American Legion Division I State Tournament at Chanhassen was played in nearly perfect baseball weather.

Wayzata, Austin, Eden Prairie and New Ulm went undefeated, winning two games on the first day.

In action Saturday in the losers' bracket, Tri-City will take on Alexandria at 10

a.m. and Princeton takes on Hutchinson at 1 p.m. at Chaska. In early games at Chanhassen. Prior Lake will play North St. Paul at 10 a.m. and Chanhassen will play Woodbury at 1 p.m.

The contests between the undefeateds will feature some interesting matchups: Large and small, city and rural.

New Ulm will play Eden Prairie at 4 p.m. and Austin will take on Wayzata at 7 p.m.

Eden Prairie and Wayzata are two of the largest school districts in the state, while New Ulm and Austin are traditional baseball powers from outstate.

Austin has the longest playing American Legion team in the state.

In Division II pool play at Morris, Foley topped Dilworth 8-0, Jordan beat Wells 5-1, LaCrescent edged Moose Lake 3-2, BOLD beat Dilworth 5-0, LaCrescent beat Morris 4-0 and Minneapolis Giantvalley topped Wells 5-3.

Left fielder saves day for Wayzata

It isn't often that a left fielder's defense puts his team in the win column, but Wayzata's Griffin Schneider did just that in a 5-4, 11-inning first-round State Legion Tournament victory over Chanhassen Friday afternoon at Chanhassen High School.

Schneider deflated Chanhassen with two spectacular plays in the bottom of the ninth with the game tied 4-4. Chanhassen loaded the bases with hits by Cullen McNeill and Nick Smith and a walk.

"With [Ty] Denzer coming up, no one out and bases loaded, it was hard to believe we'd get out of that," said Schneider after the game. But it was Schneider who made that possible. He caught a medium-deep fly ball and nailed McNeill at the plate with a perfect throw.

"I didn't think the fly ball was deep enough," said Wayzata head coach Adam Goethke. "I was thinking, please, Griffin, hit your target!"

The next Chan hitter ripped a sinking line drive to left, but with a well-timed dive, Schneider made a circus catch for the third out.

Wayzata scored the go-ahead run in the top of the 11th inning when catcher

Connor Olson grounded into a fielder's choice, scoring Parker Hlavacek.

In addition to Schneider's outstanding defense, Wayzata had a fine relief effort from winning pitcher Jake Marsh. Big hits for the Trojans included a home run by shortstop Cody Goedderz and a two-run triple off the center field fence by Connor Trygstad in the top of the ninth.

Eden Prairie swings hot bats

Jeff Athey of the Eden Prairie Legion team has had some big games this season, but he had his biggest when it counted most Friday at Round Lake Park.

Athey went five-for-five as EP outslugged Woodbury Blue 18-12 in the winners' bracket game. Teammate Wesley Young also had a huge night, going fivefor-six with six RBIs.

EP fell behind 8-3, and then the hit parade began.

"We showed some intensity at the plate," said Athey. "But we struggled a little bit with our defense. We have to clean that up."

Athey had a four-for-four game earlier this summer, but he topped it on Friday night.

EP coach Scott Hackett was pleased with his team's performance, but sees room for improvement, particularly on the defensive side.

"This was one of those war of attrition games," he said. "Obviously, we knew that Woodbury Blue can swing it. Jeff [Athey] and Wesley Young had big games, and we also had some big at-bats in the bottom of our order. Cal Lunde hit a triple and Josh Liberko had two hits."

With two wins the first day of the State Tournament, Eden Prairie improved to 33-6.
