Excelsior, Edina final unbeatens in tourney

And then there were six.

Excelsior walked off Tri-City Red 7-6 in the bottom of the seventh when Jarod Wandersee cracked a single off the mound and into center field to cap off of see-saw, hard fought game.

Excelsior took a 2-0 lead early, but Tri-City came back with three in the 4th and two more in the fifth to take a 5-2 lead. But Excelsior kept coming back, and trailed 6-5 going into the ninth setting up Wandersee's heroics.

Edina scored four in the second and held on to beat New Ulm 5-3 in the other winners' bracket game.

Lucas Flemming hit bases-clearing double to cap off the second inning.

Excelsior will now face Edina in the battle of the unbeatens on Saturday night at 6 p.m.

The winner of that game will advance to the championship game on Sunday and will automatically be one of Minnesota's two entrants into the regional tournament next week in Sioux Falls S.D.

In the losers' bracket, unheralded Buffalo won twice and will play New Ulm Gold at 12:20 p.m. Saturday. Woodbury also won twice and will play Tri-City at 10 a.m.

The winners will play each other at 3:30. All games are at Cold

South Hennepin rivals in winners' bracket final

South Hennepin rivals Edina and Excelsior will meet at 6 p.m. Saturday in the State Tournament winners' bracket final in Cold Spring.

Edina slipped past New Ulm Gold 5-3, while Excelsior scored twice in the bottom of the seventh to beat defending state champ Tri-City Red 7-6.

Drew Bishop, Edina's winning pitcher, said, "There isn't an easy out in New Ulm Gold's lineup, I'll tell you that. In the last inning I pitched to their 2-

3-4 hitters who are really tough."

Bishop threw a lot of four-seam fastballs to right-handed hitters and got some key outs against left-handed hitters with his two-seamer. He mixed in a handful of changeups and sliders.

Edina catcher Evan Brown said, "Drew always bears down and gets the job done, and tonight he was good at damage control.

Solfest makes history with tourney no-hitter

No-hitters in the State Division I American Legion Baseball Tournament are rarer than most fans realize.

Waseca coaching legend Tink Larson, a man who keeps track of such things, thought that John Solfest's no-hitter in Tri-City's 1-0 win over Austin Thursday is only the fourth State Legion no-hitter since 1975.

Solfest was surprised to hear that.

"Austin put some good swings on the ball," he said. "As long as I mix speeds, I can usually keep hitters off-balance."

Solfest, the MVP of last year's State Legion Tournament, struck out 12 Austin hitters. In the 2018 State Tournament, he pitched a similar game, tossing a one-hitter to beat Edina 2-0.

"That is my high for strikeouts this season," he noted. "I had a couple other games with 11."

This is Solfest's third year with Tri-City Red and his third State Tournament appearance.

"Two years ago, I was mainly a pitcher," he said. "Then last year, I had a bigger role on the team."

Between baseball and

hockey, Solfest said he has played in seven or eight state tournaments.

"The guys on our team are all good friends, and we're having a blast this year," he said. "Everyone on the team knows his role."

Tri-City Red is bidding for a third consecutive state Division I title. The boys won in 2017, when they hosted state at CHS Field in St. Paul. In 2018, they repeated at Edina. Threepeats in State Legion are just as rare as no-hitters.

"John has been lights-out all year," Tri-City head coach Nik Anderson said. "This is his second no-hitter of the year.

One of John's strengths is the way he keeps hitters guessing. We give him the ball and watch him put on a show."

Seven-inning games make days shorter

Long days at the ballpark have become shorter at the 2019 State American Legion Tournament, thanks to a rules amendment that allows Legion to play seven innings instead of nine. Effective this year, Legion Tournament games will be seven innings at the State, Regional and World Series levels.

The first day of the tournament, Aug. 1 reflected the impact of seven-inning games.

"I realized last night that we were going to be done by 8:30 instead of 10:30," said District 6 American Legion Baseball Director Wes Thompson of Sartell. "I think it's great we made the change. Everybody likes it better. Shortening the games makes it easier when you're playing four games a day."

Thompson added, "With a 105-pitch limit and nine innings, you don't see many complete games. With seven innings, the chances are much better one pitcher can go the full game."

State American Legion

Baseball Vice Director Mike Gort of Marshall said, "Seven inning games make it easier to keep the tournament on schedule. The coaches like seven innings better because it saves on pitching. It's a better deal all-around."

District 4 American Legion Baseball Director Gail Kalata of St. Paul said, "I prefer seven-inning games because we're coupling with pitch limits, which make it difficult to get through a tournament like this. Another benefit is having shorter days. If there are rainouts or other weather considerations, it is easier to make adjustments."

Lastly, Kalata said, "Seven inning games make a shorter day for volunteers, the host committee staff and the State American Legion Baseball representatives."

Wes Thompson concurred. Instead of spending 14 hours at the park the first day of the State Tournament, he finished his duties at the ballpark in just under 12 hours.
