However, the throw to first was off the mark that left White Bear first baseman John Goneau in a dangerous position. He made the catch, but collided with Frakes. Goneau was left with a broken arm. Dr. Bob Weber, working concessions at the time, quickly attended to Goneau while an ambulance was called. Approximately 30 minutes later the game was ruled a forfeit, but play resumed as Red outfielder Cory Sheets volunteered to play with White Bear.

One inning later, the disabled list claimed another as Tri-City's Justin Hemauer's slide into third base left him without a helmet and a split second later, a head on collision with the third baseman's knee. Hemauer (2 for 3, BB, 2-RBI) finished with a triple — and a concussion. Dr. Weber was again summoned and following the game Hemauer was brought to the hospital for further observation. He was released before the night was over, but will be out of action for a few days.

The game was called after four innings and the Red leading 17-2. A 10-run fourth led to the early stoppage. The scoring bounty was sparked by a flurry of free passes and one hit — a grand slam by Adam Weber (2 for 4). Other big hits were gathered by Brady Field (1 for 3, BB) and Blake Searles (1 for 2, SF, 2B, RBI). Evan Eid went 2 for 4 (2-RBI).
